This research project advances ongoing struggles in the US to institute the Right to Food at local and national policy levels. Even though most people in the US agree with the basic premise that access to food is a basic human right, how to implement the protections for the right to food and what constitutes a violation of this human right is unclear and varies among different stakeholders. There is a need for a deeper and more nuanced understanding of "narrative barriers and possibilities" that motivate different local populations, organizers and advocates, and policymakers with respect to food. The aim of this research project is to identify dominant hunger narratives and counter-narratives that can shift the conversation in order to develop more effective long-term strategies for ending hunger.

The SDSU-Imperial Valley (IV) campus currently addresses the problem of student hunger through a newly developed food pantry providing nonperishable food items and some fresh fruits and vegetable options. The Nourishing Communities project seeks to support and extend this work by transforming the SDSU-IV food pantry into a centralized Food Hub to mobilize community resources and address hunger in this border community more broadly. The Food Hub will be at the center of food insecurity research and activism that reframes hunger on the SDSU-IV campus within the broader context of Imperial County.
